<u>Tony Landers</u> is the Director of the Department of Community Services for the Atlanta Regional Commission. He has held several key leadership positions throughout the ARC organization. He currently manages the divisions of Local Government Services, Workforce Development and Aging Services. He co-founded and directs two executive development programs, the Regional Leadership Institute (RLI) and LINK-a learning program that takes established community leaders to a different city/region each year. As head of the official metropolitan planning organization for the 10-county, 63-city Atlanta Region, he oversees and directs regional planning programs in the areas of transportation, air quality, the environment, land use, water supply and quality, as well as aging services and workforce development. Mr. Krautler began his work in regional planning councils as the Executive Director of the Baltimore Metropolitan Council. Before coming to ARC, he was President of the Triangle J Council of Governments, in Raleigh-Durham, North Carolina. Earlier in his career Mr. Krautler served as Manager of Public Affairs for the Washington Gas Light Company in Washington, DC and Executive Vice President of the Maryland Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Krautler is a member of numerous professional organizations. He currently serves as the President of the Georgia Association of Regional Development Centers (GARDC) and is a member of the National Association of Regional Councils (NARC); the Clean Air Campaign (CAC) Board of Directors; the Georgia Foreign Trade Zone Board of Directors; the Southeastern Regional Directors Institute (SERDI); the Metropolitan Atlanta Chamber of Commerce; the Atlanta Rotary Club and the Regional Leadership Forum (RLF). Mr. Krautler has been recognized by Georgia Trend magazine as one of the 100 Most Influential Georgians. Mr. Krautler received both a Bachelors and Masters degree from East Carolina University. As GM/CEO, McCrillis has assumed the oversight of MARTA's transition to an all smart-card fare collection system and the overhaul of the Authority's 238 oldest rail cars – two projects critical to the future success of the transit agency – as well as programs to upgrade trackway, improve communications systems and streamline business processes. He is an active participant in the newly formed Transit Planning Board, which has been charged with formulating a plan for delivering and sustaining public transportation that will meet the metro Atlanta region's ever growing needs. He has served on many medical and health boards, and in September 2005 he was selected to serve on the Board of Directors of the national American Institute of Architects (AIA).

Jeff Dorfman is an economist and professor at The University of Georgia, where he has been since 1989. He teaches classes in economic theory and the economics of the food industry and performs research on productivity measurement and the economics of growth and sprawl. He has authored a book, over fifty academic journal articles and a variety of other articles published in trade publications, the popular press and on the web. He has testified to the U.S. Senate Agriculture Committee, to the Georgia Senate Special Committee on Feedgrains, and to a USDA Panel on Farmland Preservation. He is a consultant to a variety of business and foundations with past and current clients including Sprint, the Turner Foundation, the American Farmland Trust, The Georgia Conservancy, Pennington Seed, Fulton County Schools and numerous city and county governments in the Southeastern U.S. He is married, with one daughter and they attend Central Presbyterian Church where he serves as treasurer.

Bill Floyd (RLI Class of 2005) was elected to the City Commission in 1991. He served as Mayor Pro Tem from 1994-1995 and has served as Mayor since 1998. He is president of W.F. He is currently the 3rd Vice President of the Georgia Municipal Association (GMA), putting him in line to be the President in 2009; and the chair of the Metropolitan Atlanta Mayor's Association (MAMA). He is a graduate of Auburn University and received an MBA from Georgia State University. He is a graduate of Leadership DeKalb, an active member of Decatur First United Methodist Church, and serves on the Board of Directors of Decatur First Bank and the Decatur Education Foundation. He is a former chair of the DeKalb Rape Crisis Center Board.

Tad Leithead (RLI Class of 1991) is Senior Vice President of Cousins Properties, where he is responsible for leading the Cousins office development efforts in the Atlanta market. He has 23 years of experience in the Atlanta commercial real estate market. He was hired as an office leasing agent by Trammell Crow Company in 1983, and was promoted to leasing director of the Atlanta Galleria in 1986. He has leased over five million square feet of office space. In 1998, he formed Urban One Associates, a Development and Transportation Consulting firm. He served as a consultant to the Midtown Alliance, Perimeter Center, Gwinnett County and others in the formation of several Community Improvement Districts.
